All the Steering Group posts will be vacated at the Annual General Meeting in March 2021 and Members have the opportunity to nominate and elect people to the Steering Group then. Meanwhile, the Steering Group will continue to work on issues such as FOW's 5-year plan; where we are exploring how we can undertake ecological surveys of the paths, water levels and biodiversity of the woodlands before developing a detailed plan. We are continuing to work closely with the Council's Park Service on issues such as the dumping of garden waste and other concerns raised by Members and the wider community.

BBC Countryfile

We were surprised and somewhat flattered last month to be contacted by the producers of BBC Countryfile, who wanted to do a feature on volunteer conservation groups working during the pandemic. They had heard about the Friends of Oxleas Woodlands and were keen to visit the woodlands and to talk to us about the woods and our activities. Whilst our activities have been severely restricted over the past year we have managed to keep a 'skeleton' work party in operation, when Coronavirus protocols allowed.

On a rather wet and misty December morning we met the Countryfile film crew in the Oxleas car park and were introduced to the presenter Margherita Taylor, who although she lives in London, had never been to Oxleas. Margherita was keen to learn all about FOW and its various activities. She and the crew interviewed members of the work party and helped-out with the thinning of holly in Jack Wood. Although we had expected them to be with us for only a few hours, they spent the whole day filming, and finished by shooting a piece with a stunning sunset through the trees. The film – which will only be a few minutes long (despite hours of filming) – is scheduled to be broadcast on 10th January.

New Trees for Oxleas

Earlier this month Deansfield Primary School Year 6 pupils and Eltham Enviros have planted 22 oak saplings at the end of Oxleas Meadow as part of a tree planting initiative.

We will be adding new trees to this area over the winter with a further donation of over 200 trees from the Woodland Trust.
