

Council unveils proposals based on Boris' £3m investment in Eltham


Things are looking up for Eltham High Street after years of pressure from local Councillors and other residents, with Mayor of London Boris Johnson investing millions of pounds; a government-built new Community Hospital; the Coalition sponsored refurbishment of Eltham Church of England School and Greenwich Council investing in a new cinema.

This summer the consultants employed by Greenwich Council unveiled their plans for improvements to the High Street using the £3m provided by the Mayor of London. Residents have been invited to comment on the proposals by the 11th September. Key elements to the proposals include:

 Adding a diagonal crossing at the Well Hall Road junction outside McDonalds. - Expansion of the pedestrianisation of Passey Place up to the Community Hospital, including new trees and a digital sign to allow displays of Council propaganda at regular intervals.



- Widening the pavements to give more space to pedestrians
- Reducing the number of parking spaces (see below)

The multi-million pound cinema development is expected to make a profit for Greenwich Council.

According to the adverts aiming to attract shops, the largest unit will cost over £100,000 to rent and the cinema will open in 2017.

Eltham High Street are extremely positive and will add other proposed improvements which have already happened. The Council's proposals for the High Street generally are a more mixed bag with positives like the extended pedestrianisation of Passey Place but real concerns over the loss of parking."

Council double talk over parking around Eltham

Greenwich Council's plans for Eltham High Street include a 75% reduction in the number of parking spaces from 59 to 21. The Council's consultants explain that this reduction is acceptable as "New CPZ plans will free some 200 spaces, 160 of which are

within a 3 minute walk to the High Street."

This means that while residents living near the High Street are having Controlled Parking Zones (CPZs) introduced on the basis it will make it easier to park outside their homes, the Council is stating in a

different consultation that people will be able to park more easily in neighbouring roads because of the CPZ arrangements.

Councillor Spencer Drury said "I really feel that the loss of parking spaces on the High Street could damage our shops, making it less convenient for people to stop off in Eltham. At the same time, it is deceitful for the Council to claim that CPZs will make it easier for residents to park outside their own homes while forcing users of the High Street on to nearby roads." Putting Eltham's MP Clive Efford under the spotlight

while we still wait on his decade old promise to deliver the DLR. – Eltham can do better than this.

Council stops time for Eltham church clock

Eltham Councillor Spencer Drury has put pressure on Greenwich Council over its failure to ensure that a prominent church clock in Eltham is working.

At July's Council meeting, Spencer secured a commitment from Council Leader that 'the door is always open' if the church requires support in making sure St John the Baptist Church clock at the top of Eltham High Street is not to be permanently stuck at midday. Councillor Drury's question followed an article in July's SE9 magazine (*Our Town Clock Stopped*), which reported that the Council had refused to fund maintenance of the clock as it has done in the past.

Greenwich's Labour Council refused to fund maintenance of the clock — one of the first visible landmarks for anyone entering Eltham high street - as it has done in the past having previously undertaken regular servicing of the clock. Spencer established that the Council's last expenditure was in 2012, when £1,243 was spent on a service and some

repairs.

At the same time as refusing to fund the repairs of Eltham's landmark clock, the Council is continuing to ensure that four other clocks are maintained, including the one at the Clockhouse Community Centre in Woolwich which is well off the beaten track for most residents.

Spencer commented "The Council's decision to stop using an average of £400 each year supporting a major landmark in Eltham is simply wrong. The Mayor of London is investing millions of pounds in Eltham

High Street and the Council is prioritising a cinema, but basic housekeeping like ensuring the town centre clock works seems beyond them. It is a real shame and shows a lack of joined up thinking about supporting Eltham and its High Street."

Eltham resident, 22-year-old James Shipp said "I have worshipped at St John's since I was a child but even people who don't attend church see this historic clock as an iconic symbol of Eltham. I can't understand why the Council isn't continuing to fund its upkeep."

Upset Labour Councillor removes Officer over weeds

Greenwich Council's Labour Cabinet Member responsible for the state of our streets confessed to being 'upset' over the weeds across our streets this summer and offered the apologies of her Department for the failure when questioned by Eltham North Councillor Spencer Drury.

In answer to previous questions from Conservative Councillors, Council Officers wrote that "It is not possible to prevent weed growth" leading to the creation of the mocking #weedsinbloom hashtag on twitter.

At July's Council meeting, Spencer pointed out that in 2012 and 2014, the Council had used weather conditions

as a reason for the excessive weed growth but this year the Council had not even got round to appointing

someone to deal with the problem until late June. The Cabinet Member acknowledged this point and stated that the person responsible no longer worked for the Council.

Spencer said "Whilst it is good that the Cabinet Member concerned has acknowledged the Council's failings on this matter, it seems to be a perennial problem and they need to be much more proactive in ensuring it is planned for

and dealt with. This year I remain concerned that the spraying is taking place so late that the Council will

> simply turn green weeds brown and leave then decaying on our pavements."

According to the Council's published schedule, Eltham North's weeds should have been dealt with by 31st July while Middle Park & Sutcliffe was to be completed by the 5th August. Residents will have to be the judge as to whether this treatment has been effective.

Eltham Park Controlled Parking Zone (CPZ) proposals finally published

After two years of wrangling, residents of Eltham Park are going to receive the Council's final proposals for the introduction of CPZs south of the railway line. Essentially, this means that every road will have a CPZ introduced with residents having to pay between £60 and £100 to park outside their own homes whether they voted for it or not. Given the Council's plans include getting rid of free parking behind Eltham Station, it is hard not to imagine that the net effect of these plans will be to create a massive increase in parking around the northern half of Eltham Park, meaning the Council can push more CPZs there within the year.

The Conservative Party is holding an online primary to select its candidate for the 2016 London Mayoral Election.


Anyone in London who is on the electoral roll can register to vote to help the party choose who will stand for the Conservatives in the election next year.
